The Beauvais is projected to be drilled to a depth of 11,000'. The Patterson is projected to go down to 14,700'. Upon completion, Liberty Resources, Inc. will serve as operator. Drilling operations began in mid-February.

Da Cajun and Da Water Moccasin



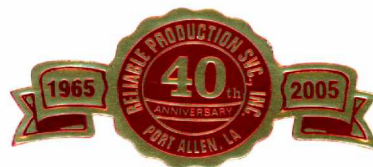

# A LABOR OF LOVE

Born: August 27, 1910  
Died: September 5, 1997



Birthplace: Skopje, Yugoslavia  
Best Known as: Humanitarian Nun  
Awards: Nobel Peace Prize - 1979  
United States Medal of Freedom - 1985

Born Agnes Gonxha Bojaxhiu, Mother Teresa grew famous for humbly ministering to lepers, the homeless and the poorest of the poor in the slums of Calcutta, India.

Though most of her young life was centered in the church, Mother Teresa later revealed that until she reached 18, she had never thought of being a nun. At that point, she decided to follow the path that seems to have been unconsciously unfolding throughout her life. She chose to join the Loreto Sisters of Dublin, Ireland, missionaries and educators.

On a retreat in 1946, she received a clear message, "Give up all and follow Christ into the slums to serve him among the poorest of the poor."

Mother Teresa found a never ending stream of human needs in the poor she met. In 1950, she founded the Missionaries of Charity. Today, the order has now grown to include branches in more than 100 cities around the world. The nuns provide homes for the dying, refuge for the care and teaching of orphans and abandon children, treatment centers and hospitals for those suffering from leprosy, alcoholism, the aged and street people, the list is endless.

Until her death in 1997, Mother Teresa continued her work among the poorest of the poor, depending on God for all of her needs. In her own eyes, she was "God's pencil" – a tiny bit of pencil with which God writes what he likes.

Despite years of strenuous physical, emotional and spiritual work, Mother Teresa seemed unstoppable. She administered compassionate care for more than 50 years. Finally, on September 5, 1997, after finishing her dinner and prayers, her weakened heart gave her back to God who was the very center of her life.
