"SAFETY FIRST"



Meteorologists Philip Klotzbach and William Gray in the 27th annual early December extended-range hurricane forecast, issued by Colorado State University's Tropical Meteorology Project, predict an above-average number of Atlantic basin hurricanes to develop during next year's hurricane season. As of December, they believe that 11-16 named storms will develop, 6-8 of them hurricanes and 3-5 of the hurricanes to become major hurricanes with winds of 111 mph or greater.

Klotzbach's and Gray's Early Forecast

*A 64 percent chance of at least one major hurricane making landfall on the U.S. coastline during 2010.

*A 40 percent probability of a major hurricane making landfall along the U.S. East Coast, including the Florida Peninsula, and along the Gulf Coast from the Florida Panhandle west to Brownsville, Texas.

*A 53 percent chance of a major hurricane making landfall in the Caribbean.

DISASTER SUPPLY KIT

Water: One gallon daily per person for 3 to 7 days.

Food: Enough for 3 to 7 days - Nonperishable packaged or canned food/juices - Food for infants or the elderly, and Nonelectric can opener.

First-Aid Kit: Make sure prescriptions are filled and you have enough medicine to last a week.

Safety Kit: Keep a good supply of batteries for the flashlight and radio, as well as candles and matches.

Make sure: All vehicles are filled with gas, and have extra fuel on hand if you plan to use a generator.

Buy supplies early to prepare for the storm. When the storm threatens, lines will be long and supplies short.

Charge all cell phones, fill all propane tanks, get cash (including coins), set your refrigerators and freezers to the coldest settings, and fill sinks and bathtubs to provide a supply of water.
