Broussard #1 is averaging 260 bbls/day and 7,100 mcf .

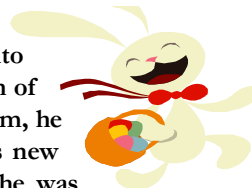
Beauvais is flowing 150 bbls/day and 1,100 mcf.

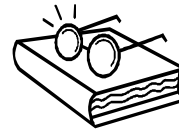

Take A Close Look
At Close Calls



A “close call” or incident without injury is easy to shrug off or forget. But, there is a danger in brushing off incidents that don’t harm or damage. When a “close call” happens, it should immediately send up a red warning flag that something is wrong, unplanned, unexpected, and could happen again. The next time it happens, it could result in serious damage, injury or death.

For every incident there are usually several contributing factors, most of which can be controlled. The best way to prevent recurrence of an incident is by looking at those “close calls.” By investigating the root causes of an incident, steps can be taken to eliminate the hazard and improve the work system.

Sometimes there are multiple causes for an incident. Don’t rush to judge. Examine the facts and find what’s missing. Look for immediate and underlying causes.

All incidents should be reported to the supervisor so that incident/injury forms can be completed. Once an investigation is completed, solutions should be sought to prevent the incident from occurring again. Solutions may involve engineering controls, administrative controls, additional training, or increased communication between management and workers.

Hazard awareness is the key to preventing incidents before they happen. Take steps to eliminate hazards as soon as they are discovered. Learn the real lesson from close calls. They can happen again and again, until they cause injury. No matter how minor it may seem at the time, you never know when an incident may be repeated and result in an injury or even death.

Who's Watching You?

Robert Fulghum, author of the book All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten is quoted saying, “Don’t worry that children never listen to you; worry that they are always watching you.” If you ask country music singer Rodney Atkins who’s watching him, according to the lyrics of his latest hit, he’d say it was his little boy. Not only did Rodney sing about the bad things his son picked up from him (four letter word), but to his credit, he found that his son watched and then imitated his faith life.

Parents with little children soon find out that when their little tyke goes to school, they are exposed to new ideas and new experiences. One day they will return home from a great day at school proclaiming that when they get big, they want to be a fireman, or a policeman, or a paramedic. Guess who came to school that day? Physiologist tells us that children are most impressionable between the ages of three and eight.

Robert Fulghum believes that what we learn in kindergarten comes up again and again in our lives. He states that the lessons will become more complex and take on many different forms, but for the most part, we are given the foundation to build upon. Mr. Fulghum’s observations and Mr. Atkins music reminds us that we are making an impression on others, especially the younger generation. With that said, I’m reminded of something I read about character – “Don’t do anything today that you wouldn’t want printed in the paper or reported about you as news tomorrow.”

Children are growing up all around us, and if you are a parent, teacher, coach, minister or a day-care worker, you have many sets of eyes watching you. The best advice/guidance I received on little children, and what to do in their presence, came from a very wise minister. He said, “And whoever welcomes a little child like this in my name, welcomes me. But if anyone causes one of these little ones who believes in me to sin, it would be better for him to have a large millstone hung around his neck and to be drowned in the depth of the sea.” (Matthew 18:5-6)
